

WOMEN AT WAR

Women were always misjudged as weak critters, both mentally and physically. But leaving all the stereotypes and differences behind, they have served in the military in many different roles in Akansha Trivedi various jurisdictions throughout history. So throwing some light on women in combat roles, 14 percent of the active-duty Army, 23 percent of the Army Reserve, and 16 percent of the YOU ARE NEEDED NOW

Army National Guard (U.S military). But this improvement is not so recent. Back in the days, women played some really important roles like in the battle of World War 2.

As World War I sucked in millions of young men into the killing field across Europe, it also turned into an opportunity for women on the continent to leave their humdrum and do something upfront. Their main role in World War I (1914-1918) was employment in munitions factories, farming, and other roles to replace men drafted for the army. They played an important role in making the system of food rationing work. The experiences of women in war have been diverse.

Historically women have played a major role on the home front. By the 18th century, some

women accompanied armies were assigned combat missions. All the provinces and territories followed the suit and similar volunteer groups emerged. While most of the men were joining up, doing something to win the war. Surely women could help as well!".

In addition to the Red Cross, several volunteer corps had designed themselves after auxiliary groups from Britain. World War II (1939-1945) marked a decisive turning point, with millions of women handling important home frontroles; approximately 350,000 American women joined the military during World War II. They worked as nurses, drove trucks, repaired airplanes, and performed clerical work.

On July 2, 1942 women were permitted to enlist in what would be known as the Canadian Women's Auxiliary Air Force. □ Lastly, the Royal Canadian Navy created the Women's Royal Canadian Naval Service (WRENS). □ But there were some outrageous requirements beheld for enlistment: like age criterion (18 yrs. - 41 years), height complication of equal to or over 5 feet, and weight accordingly. They would not be considered for enlistment if they were married and had children dependent on them. The WRENS were outfitted in Galt, Ontario. Forevermore, women were paid less, twothirds of what a man at the same level would make. Whilst women were limited in some of their roles, they were expected to perform to the same standard as a male soldier performing the same role. Worst of all, even when they went for the same military training, lived in the same conditions, and did almost the same jobs as men, they were not credited for their bravery and valor as it was given to "active operations against the enemy in the field", which women could not take part in. Later military leaders began to see the substantial impact the women could make. The negative reaction of men towards the female recruits was also coming and these were addressed in propaganda films. Documentaries like She Marches and Wings on Her Shoulder were made to show the acceptance of female recruits. Once in training, some women felt that they had made a mistake. Other women felt the need to escape and ran away.

At the beginning of the war, 600,000 women in Canada held permanent jobs in the private sector; by the peak in 1943, 1.2 million women had jobs. Women quickly gained a good reputation for their mechanical dexterity and fine precision due to their smaller stature. Women also had to keep their homes together while the men were away. Most of the women veterans encountered roadblocks when they tried to take advantage of benefit programs for veterans. It seems the nation was not yet ready for the greater social equality that would slowly come in the decades to follow.

World War II is a witness of a turnout of women into the battlefields. Similar enthusiasm was shared by conscript women from all over the world. Veterans like Frances Green, Margret Kirchner, Ann Waldner and all of them who decided to break the unethical rules and fight for their nation and their freedom, were the women of millennials. Moreover recently, these stereotypes seem to reduce, for example- In 2018 only, Norway and Sweden conscripted men and women at the same formal conditions in their armed forces.

A quote that well gears my article is:

"But most of these women -- the famous and the obscure -- had one thing in common: they did not think of themselves as heroes. They followed their consciences, saw something that needed to be done, and they did it. And their sacrifice was not in vain, especially if their courage continues to inspire others to fight injustice and evil wherever they find it".

VENEZUELA CRISIS



I thought Yugoslavia (1994) was the last case of hyperinflation but I was wrong, the political socio-economic fiasco already begun in a country on the northern coast of South America. Raybbha Kapoor Hugo Chavez was the first elected president of Venezuela in 1998. He increased the oil

prices in the early 2000s which led to levels of funds not seen in Venezuela since the 1980s, however, Venezuela began to face economic difficulties due to Chavez's populist policies, and on 2 June 2010, he declared an ECONOMIC WAR.

THE ECONOMIC WAR: US DECLARED AN EMBARGO

The United States has been using Venezuela's vulnerabilities to engage in a low-grade economic war. Instead of military action, the US has imposed selected economic sanctions against certain Venezuelans. January 28, 2019, the US has declared a full-scale economic assault, it was indeed an embargo against the PETROLEOS DE VENEZUELA (PDVSA) the country's state-owned oil company that controls the world's largest oil reserves and produces virtually all of Venezuela's foreign

By 2014, the value of Venezuela's currency, the Bolivar, and the prosperity of the Venezuelan economy, was highly dependent on oil exports. More than 90% of the country's export earnings came from oil.

THE GLOBALOIL PRICE DROPPED:

exchange.

Venezuela holds the world's largest supply of crude oil, and petroleum products make up the vast majority of the country's exports. Production held virtually steady from 2002- just before the national strike to 2008 when global oil prices peaked. Figures from the ORGANIZATION OF THE PETROLEUM EXPORTING COUNTRIES show the country earned about \$60bn from oil that year.

But the collapse in oil prices towards the end of 2014- a year after Mr. Chavez died from cancer which decimated the country's already-struggling oil-dependent economy. The global price of oil dropped. Foreign demand for the Bolívar to buy Venezuelan oil crashed. As the currency's value fell, the cost of imported goods rose. The Venezuelan economy went into crisis. Oil production in Venezuela has suffered from a poor oil

EPISODES OF HYPERINFLATION:

The solution of Venezuela's new president Nicolas Maduro was to print more money. This might seem silly but it can keep the economy moving while it gets over a hump caused by short-term price shocks.

The Venezuelan crises, however just got worse as the oil price continued to deplete, compounded by other factors. International investors started to look elsewhere, driving the Bolivar even lower. In these conditions, printing more money simply made the problem worse. It added to the supply of currency, pushing the value down even further. As the prices rose, the government printed more money to pay the bills, this cycle is what causes HYPERINFLATION.



Over 3 million Venezuelans fled from the country since 2014, they have landed into neighboring Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Chile; few others have gone south to Brazil.

THE CURRENCY MARKET TOOK A NOSE-DROP:

Venezuelans started to convert their savings into stable currency, like the US dollar. This lowered the value of the Bolivar even further.

The government responded by issuing currency controls. It set a fixed exchange rate, to stop the official value of the Bolivar dropping against the US dollar, and made it difficult to get the permission to exchange Bolivares into

US dollars. The idea was to stabilize the currency by effectively shutting down all currency transactions. US dollars were still available in the black market, however. This increasing demand meant the black market price for the greenbacks rose, creating a difference between the official exchange rate (set up by the government) and the unofficial exchange rates.

ZERO MEDICAL BACK-UP:

Venezuela has suffered a huge rise in the number of malaria cases in recent years, out of 24 states at least 10 states have the cases even though Venezuela was the first country certified to have eliminated the disease in 1961. The Venezuelan Health Observatory has reported widespread shortages of antimalarial drugs- for all strains.

Jose Felix Oletta, infectious disease specialist and former health minister, says projections for 2018 suggest an increase of 50% in the number of cases in 2017.

Measles and diphtheria have also returned with a vengeance.

With the ongoing political-economic crisis and Maduro's oppressive treatment of dissentall we can do is pray for Venezuela before it becomes the next North Korea.







The wise man smiled and said:


"You can't laugh at the same joke over and over. So why are you always crying about the same problem?"

Moral of the story:




