चन्द्रलोक के पत्थर

सन् सुनाई १९५३ की अगोखो म्हासुह आरा की किन्ही कन्डलीक के पत्थरी पर पाये गये । इन डिब्बों में ४६ पत्थर और काली भूष थी । इन पत्थरों की लम्बाई एक मीट्रीमीटर से तेरह मीट्रीमीटर तक थी । पहली धारक में जो वे पत्थर छरती के पत्थरों के सामान लगे परन्तु बाद में पता चला कि वे इन दुनिया के पत्थरों से भिन्नकृत भिन्न थे ।

The Diamond Jubilee of Rev. Br. J.G. Pakenham

May the 20th was a red letter day in the annals of St. Joseph's. It was the Diamond Jubilee of Reverend Brother J. G. Pakenham. It was a day of thanksgiving and congratulations to one who had dedicated sixty years of his life in the service of the young boys of India. Br. Pakenham was born in Dublin in 1859. At the age of 21 he joined the Christian Brothers and in 1916 we find him on his way to India. During his years here he has worked in several of our establishments, filling the office of Principal in St. Joseph's, Calcutta, St. Vincent's, Asansol, St. Aloysius', Quilon and St. Joseph's, Naini Tal. At the age of 81 he is here in Naini Tal doing his share of work and interested in all the activities of the College.

May the 20th began with a conclebrated Mass in the Auditorium at which Reverend Fathers Fulgentius, Constant and Samuel officiated. The auditorium was most tastefully decorated for the occasion. Boys, members of the staff, some nuns from St. Mary's Convent and well wishers were present to give thanks and praise to God and to pray for further blessings on the jubilarian. Rev. Fr. Fulgentius, O.F.M.Cap. spoke in glowing terms of the dream of the young man who sixty years ago saw before him the youth of India asking him to come and teach them. During those years of loyal and devoted service this Brother has never looked back but has always lived the life of a humble religious devoted to his calling. Concluding by wishing the jubilarian God's choicest blessings, the speaker begged God to grant to our jubilarian many more years of fruitful service in the Lord's vineyard. The choir excelled itself under the direction of Rev. Br. Emmanuel.

During the day a flood of letters and telegrams from all over the world kept pouring in. Many were from his Brothers in religion while many more were from his past pupils. At the conclusion of the Concert which was held in his honour Br. Pakenham spoke briefly on some of his experiences during his years but especially during his time as Principal of St. Joseph's.

During dinner messages of congratulation were read by Rev. Br. Hughes on behalf of the Brothers, Staff and pupils of St. Joseph's, by Rev. Br. Thomas on behalf of the Provincial (who was unavoidably absent) and the Brothers of the Providence and lastly the Jubilarian was presented with the Papal Blessing from His Holiness, Pope Paul VI. Br. Pakenham, with his usual wit and good humour, replied to all the messages and thanked those who had made the day memorable. He now looks forward to many more years of fruitful service in God's vineyard and for God's children.

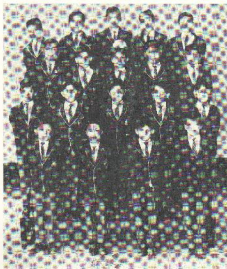

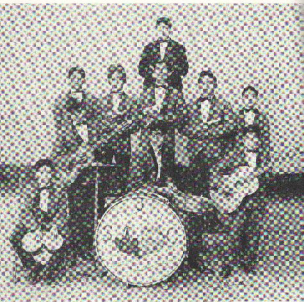

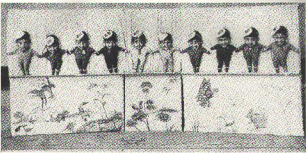

The National Flag was hoisted by the Scout Master. The Scout Master then invested twenty-one scouts who were to receive their badges.



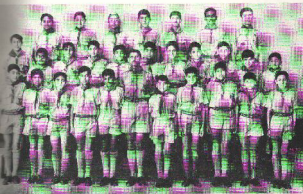
Scout Master Keeler takes the oath with the Scout Troop.

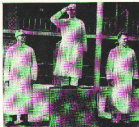

The fortnight that followed proved a very successful one,



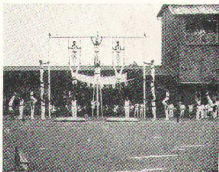
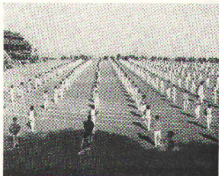

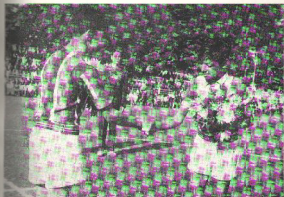

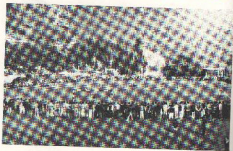
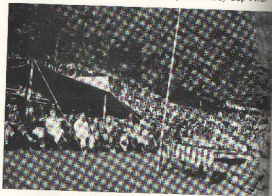


Sherwood & S.J.C. Teams before the match.

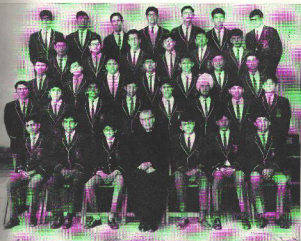

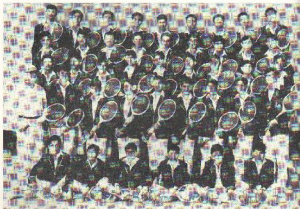

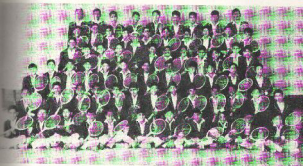

Br. Placidus Ewin

Many of the present and past pupils will remember Br. Ewin who used to come to St. Joseph's for his summer holidays. After a life of labour, devotion to duty and strict religious observance this dear Brother passed away peacefully in Ramsey Hospital on the evening of May 21st.

Br. Ewin was born 65 years ago in Calcutta and, as a boy attended St. Joseph's College in that city. He entered the Congregation of the Christian Brothers in 1925 and did his novitiate and preparatory training at Mount Carmel, Kurseong. He made his final profession in 1932 and thence forward devoted himself with untiring zeal and energy in the various duties which were assigned to him. His active life was spent mainly on the staffs of St. Mary's, Mt. Abu, St. Michael's, Patna; The Catholic Male Orphanage, Calcutta and St. George's Free School, Calcutta. His delight was to work with the poor children and his patience and good example must have stood and still stands as a beacon to many of his past pupils, when they think of him. Very few were aware of his ill health. In later years he retired to St. Patrick's Asansol where he still carried on the good work in spite of bad health. He came up to St. Joseph's on the 9th of May for his summer holidays. He was not too well but this was attributed to the journey through the scorching heat of the plains and it was hoped that in a few days he would be his old self. However, God had other plans for this good Brother. After constant care by Sr. Stella in the School hospital he was admitted to Ramsey Hospital on the 18th. Here he was given every attention and passed peacefully to his Maker on the 21st at about 5 p.m. He died so peacefully that it was scarcely noticed. The funeral took place the next day in the Brothers' Cemetery in Jodlkote. He had a wonderful funeral. His mortal remains now lie by the side of those stalwarts - whom many of our past pupils will remember - Brs. Connolly, Wells, Downing, Dougherty, Butler, Lomergan, Sharpe, O'Reilly, Cuddy, Farmer, Mockler, Lynch, A. Murphy - who await the final summons on the Last Day. I am sure the past and present pupils will breathe a prayer for those Brothers who have instructed others unto justice.

May all those Brothers rest in the peace of Christ.

Rev. Dr. Conrad de Vito - Bishop of Lucknow.

On Wednesday the 14th of November we received the sad news that our beloved Bishop the Rt. Rev. Dr. Conrad De Vito, O.F.M. Cap had died of a heart attack in Bologna, Italy.

Dr. De Vito will be remembered by many of the past and present pupils of this College. It was he who confirmed many of them. Several of the past pupils will remember him and cherish his memory when he was Chaplain to St. Joseph's College for his kindly ways and cheerful disposition.

Dr. De Vito was consecrated as the first Bishop of Lucknow in 1947, two years after the new Catholic diocese was formed out of the vast mission of Allahabad. Before being ordained priest in 1927, Dr. De Vito served in the Italian army for a short period and later served as professor of the Gregorian University in Rome. He came to India in 1932 and made this country his home. During World War II he was interned in Dehra Dun, and after freedom he acquired Indian Nationality. Before being consecrated Bishop he served in Naini Tal, Allahabad and as Parish priest of St. Joseph's Cathedral, Lucknow.

The late Bishop De Vito was responsible for founding several charitable and educational institutions in the Diocese. The poor old people, the orphans and the children in these institutions will send up heaven their prayers for this great benefactor without whom many of them would be homeless. Perhaps one of his greatest achievements was the creation of a Diocesan Seminary in Lucknow for training Indian priests, many of whom are now serving in the Lucknow Diocese.

A requiem Mass was offered on the 19th and 20th of November in St. Joseph's Chapel at which the Catholic boys and members of the Staff prayed for the repose of Bishop Conrad, their friend and benefactor.

May his dear soul rest in peace.

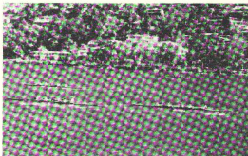
Bro. Pakemata watches the Boat Race.

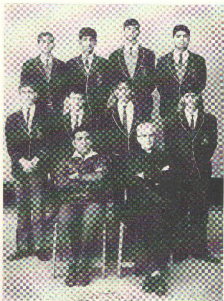

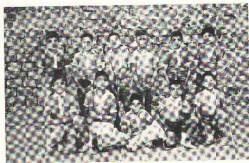

We offer his wife and relatives our deepest sympathy and an assurance of our prayers for the repose of his soul". Sir Peter was born in a well known business family, received his education at St. Joseph's College, Nairn Tal and later went to Roorkee where he qualified as a Civil Engineer, securing both scholarships and medals. Though Chevalier de Noronha had a distinguished secular career, it is in his work for the Church in the Dioceses of Allahabad and Kanpur that he will be most remembered. During the floods of 1930 his charity saved so many that the authorities awarded him a Certificate of Merit. His charitable disposition was again evident in the riots of 1940. He was the Legion

of Mary envoy for many years and he was largely responsible spreading this organisation throughout Northern India. In 1963 when he was awarded the Order of knighthood of St. Gregory, his wife, Lady Florence was also awarded the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice Gold medal for her outstanding social work in the city of Kanpur.
