The Aftermath

At about 3.30 as the boys came out from tes, the sky became overcase and a cold fog began to cover the hillside. Soon overcoats were donned and the policeman guarding the chopper must have envied the boys in their warm coats, while they were clad only in cotton farments, but who would have thought that the weather would change so quickly. when provisions were not readily available and the smaller influx of boys -- far above the number the school was built to take - did nothing to lighten her acduous task. She was never heard to complain but now that each boy got sufficient. She was always present in the dining room during meals time. In 1957 Mes, Gleeton and her husband the catering arrangements for the Brothers when they came for their summer helidays. Herself and her instand lived happily there vanil God called him to his reward in November 1968. From that time onwards, the still carried on looking after the house and garden. This gave her great happiness and On September 15th Mrs. Gleeson passed away peacefully in her sleep. She died as she would have wished to die without giving anybody any trouble, The day before she died, Fr. Joseph Pais, O.F.M. Cap the school chaplain heard her confession and gave her Holy Communion. When the funeral arrangements were completed, the corpse was taken to leolikote where the was boried close to her husband. The large attendance at her funeral was an ample demonstration of the affection with which she was held by all. rich and poor, the educated and the illiterate. Many of those scalous workers who did so nouch for St. Joseph's lie in the peaceful concrery at Isolikote to await the final summons for a life well spent. May they all have the prace of Christ.


