
I am sure this year will be remembered as one of the great years for cricket in S. J. C.



The 88th Annual Athletic Meet 1975

Our Annual Sports went off eventually on the thirtieth of May. Prior to this, Sports practice commenced on the first of May. When it seemed that every athlete was at the peak of his form, Sports Week began.

Rev. Bro. Kyle, our Principal, ceremoniously declared the Sports Week open and in the subsequent march-part, Tagore House outshone its opponents. From the very first day Nehru House jumped into the lead and maintained it until the termination of sports. Every athlete endeavoured to gain valuable points for his house, and a week brimming of frenetic activity passed in a flash.

Sports day did not dawn bright and clear. Instead, ominous thunderclouds augured a downpour before the day was out. In spite of this everyone crossed their fingers and sweated and toiled at providing seating arrangements for our guests.

Although the weather threatened to get worse, by mid-day the field was a blaze of colour. To everyone's relief the rain held-off when the day's events began at 2.30 p.m.

His Excellency Dr. C. Reddy, Governor of Uttar Pradesh presided over the function. The first event of the day was the march-part and again Tagore House emerged victorious. In a highly exciting race, S. Sasi won the hundred metres dash clocking 11.8 seconds which was a mere 0.4 second short of the school record.

After a series of tension-filled events came the one most looked forward to by everybody—The Imitation Relay. From the firing of the starter's gun, Sem was spurred onwards by lusty cheers from the home crowd. Our team did not let us down. Beating their formidable rivals from Sherwood College, Sem A Relay set a new record. Though our Staff Relay team threw themselves with vigour into the race, they could not emulate their previous year's performance.

In the other events, M. Sarin of 'F' Division relegated his opponents into the shade by equalling the fifty metre record and narrowly missing the hundred metre record. In "E" division, S. Thapa proved that he is as athletic this year as last. The champion of "B" division on the final day was undoubtedly S. Sarin who won both his events with ease. In the other divisions A. Mathias and A. Wilson surpassed themselves.

Next, the relays held everybody enthralled. The division relay was by far the most interesting with Tagore house breaking the existing record and Nehru house equalling it.

At 4 O'Clock the day-tots of Classes 1 and 2 were marshalled for their final work. Performing their exercises faultlessly in their gay attire, they won the hearts

of all. This was followed by the free arm exercise, gracefully executed by Classes 3 and 4. The subsequent stylish display of Cricket Strokes by Classes 5, 6 and 7 and finally a spectacular arrangement of gymnastic exercises by the Senior Classes, marked the culmination of Sports Day. To round off the display, Classes 5 to 11 delighted everybody with a large pyramid and individual Class Pyramids.

As the final house march-past was in progress, the long expected storm finally burst. Undaunted by the gusts of dusty wind, the boys delivered the final salute. The downpour started while the prizes were being given out, but the soldiers of Beta stood bravely in their ranks until the lowering of the flag. At the end of the Sports, Nehru House emerged the victor with the highest aggregate of points.

As the spectators dispersed and all the boarders made preparations for their week's holidays, one was left wondering whether the 19th Annual Athletic Meet would be as successful as this one.







The Annual Concert

This year as usual Sem staged the eagerly anticipated annual concert. The fruition of weeks of sweat and toil were three superb one-act plays under the guidance of Miss Sud and Bro. Walsh.

As we trooped into the auditorium an atmosphere of tension prevailed. Would our School live up to its reputation.....

As the curtains slowly drew apart, a hush fell on the audience. We were transported to the city of Isfahan. Before us, Eric Lima Leitao acting as Hallaj, the hero of the play, sat composing. Ibn Hassim, the rich old jeweller, had offered his lovely daughter Silvermoon to any man who could compose the best quatrain in praise of her. Nevertheless a condition went along with it—ten silver pieces had to accompany the verse. The Poetasters of Isfahan had their verses written down by Hallaj (for a small fee of course), since they were illiterate.

The cunning Hallaj wanted to win the hand of Silvermoon, so, in the absence of his opponents he altered their verses, making hideously stupid lines of them. The four poetasters allowed themselves to be dizzled out of ten silver pieces as well! The play sparkled with humour contributed mainly by S. Dutt, acting as Aladin, the vendor of perfume. The diminutive Aladin did not allow his size to hinder him from being haughty, and he acted arrogantly with all the characters in the play.

The drama ends with Ibn Hassim showering his blessings upon Hallaj and Silvermoon.

The scene shifted to India, and for the next half-hour we were treated to yet another comedy, this time in Hindi. In a side-splitting mix-up M. Ashti as Mr. Verma is accused of bestowing his affections upon a lady other than his wife. A. Dhir as Mrs. Verma and A. Mehra as Mrs. Michael added to the humour. Sanjay Goel as Mr. Michael brought the hall down with laughter. The play culminated with A. Sabai portraying Surendra producing the "Carbon Copy" to untangle the plot.

A brief interval was followed by "The Game of Chess". In contrast with the previous two comedies, a grim tragedy now transformed the hall from pleasant mirth to silent seriousness. V. K. Singh as Boris Ivanovitch Shamerayeff had been elected to assassinate the old Russian Governor Alexis Alexandrovitch. R. Abuja skilfully plays the part of the old Governor. The cunning Alexz regarded life as a game of chess, where one false step could prove fatal. Against poisoning he had taken a fantastic precaution by accustoming himself to doses which would normally blast the life out of an ordinary man. Making his moves shrewdly, Alexandrovitch deceives Shamerayeff with the story of changeling foster brothers. In a solemn ceremony

they take poison together. The end was inevitable for Shumayeff, though the Governor experienced only the slightest of headaches. R. Ahuja certainly brought grimness to the play, ably helped by V. K. Singh.

Aquatics

Our Swimming Sports were held this year on the 5th of September. Spectators crowded the pool which looked new in its fresh coat of paint and the competitors waited nervously for the start of the events.

At 1 p.m., the starter triggered off the first race that afternoon, the 25 m. free style 'A' division, and the Aquatic Meet had begun. It recalled the memory of last year's 25 m., which was the best ever witnessed in St. Joseph's College. The record had been shattered. Nevertheless there was as much enthusiasm on the part of the competitors as in any other year. Gallant efforts resulted in making the afternoon an exciting one, even in the miserable weather. And so event followed even; and the cheering never stopped and the time passed fast.

Until that time only three records had been broken, two by C. Sen and one by the D. Division Nehru House Relay. Another one would have been broken in the 4th event by the same person again but for an unfortunate happening. The day had been hot and almost all the shots of the starter's gun had got moist and would not fire. So the only sound that came was the pulling of the trigger. When that happened C. Sen and one or two of the others plunged into the pool and disappeared in the splash of water. But the starter evidently thought it unfair so he whistled to them to stop. But they carried on. It is very difficult to hear in the water especially when you are not expecting it and seeing bright prospects ahead. Soon whistles blew from all round the pool in an effort to stop the lunging swimmers. But these went unheard too. So when C. Sen looked up expectantly after finishing the race to see if he had broken the record, he realized he had wasted his energy. Despairation clouded his face and he went back truly dismayed. He won the race eventually but he had lost the opportunity of creating another record. However, in the 50 m. free style, a later race, he broke the record, his own previous year's. The 'A' division Relay was another item in which a new record was made. Close races were the 25 m. Breast Stroke 'A' division between R.K. Gupta and E. Lima Latao, the 25 m. Butte By Stroke 'A' division between M. Mathur and A. Agarwal and the Medley Relay 'A' division between Tagore House and Gandhi House.

In points Tagore House was beating Gandhi House by only eight points but enough to stay winners even if they lost the subsequent House events. Water polo, which isn't they were expecting to win, Nehru House stood third and Pant House fourth.

The prize distribution was followed by a speech by the Principal and Chief Guest, Father Mathias, and this marked the end of the 21st Aquatics Meet.

The swimmers along with the spectators retired to the dining room where a warm tea awaited them.



the Chief Guest arrived. The first fight started with the Atom Weight. The youngists fought on, giving as well as taking punches, bravely without flinching.


