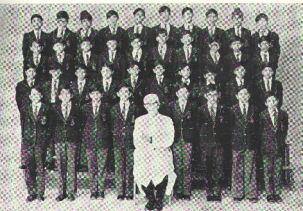

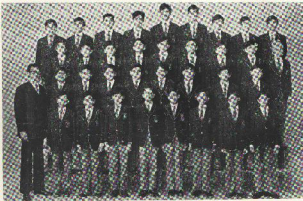

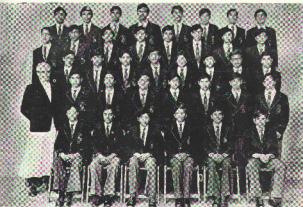

Obituary

Our Loyal Departed Friends

On June 4th 1976 at Kanpur one of St. Joseph's renowned past pupils passed to his eternal reward. He was the Very Reverend Monsignor Terence Otto Hogan. Terence Hogan, the son of Irish parents, domiciled in India, was born in Naini Tal in 1893. He had his primary and secondary education in St. Joseph's which he attended as a Day Scholar. After he had completed his Intermediate Examination he was sent by Bishop Gramigna to the Papal Seminary at Kandy for the required training and studies. In January 1921 Fr. Hogan was appointed Headmaster of St. Joseph's Collegiate School Allahabad, a post which he held until the close of 1952. His teaching and administrative programme was adjusted so that he was able to attend classes at the Allahabad University from where he took the B.A. and the M.A. The following year Bishop Poli sent him to Oxford where he acquired the Diploma of Education. In 1934 Fr. Hogan was accorded the title of Monsignor by the Holy Father and it was by this title he was thereafter known. In 1952 he asked permission to retire from the service of the School and for the next fifteen years he taught Church History at the Seminary. In his 75th year he felt he could carry on no longer and he retired to the Ursuline Hospital in Kanpur where he was cared for until God called him to Himself. May he rest in peace.

Another name which is familiar to many of the boys who have been through St. Joseph's during the past 21 years was Mr. Freitas. Mr. Freitas came to St. Joseph's as General Manager in March 1955. Prior to his being employed in St. Joseph's he worked as a caterer on the Railways and before that he served in the Army. He saw service from Burma to the Middle East. His time in St. Joseph's was spent in charge of the stores, supervision of servants and daily labourers. In 1975 he was relieved of his work in the stores. These were taken by Mrs. Moore and Gomes. His work was very light and all he had to do was to have a check on the daily workers on the College grounds. On April 7th as he was not feeling well, the doctor was called and he advised that Mr. Freitas be taken to hospital. After a check-up, he wished to go back once again to St. Joseph's. Within a week he was back with us but was far from well. Sr. Justina, the school nurse, was visiting in her attention day and night. On May the 5th he was once again transferred to Ramnary Hospital where he passed away peacefully to his Creator at 2.30 p.m. on the 11th. Next day a special Mass was offered for him in the School Chapel and his remains were later transferred to the cemetery in Jeelkote where he lies near former workers of Sorn, among whom may be mentioned, Mr. Wailing, Mr. and Mrs. Gleason. May they all rest in peace.

Yet another staunch friend of St. Joseph's passed away just two months later on July 11th. He was Mr. Manohar Lal Sah. Manohar Lal Sah was born at Almorah in 1894, he went to Ewing Christian College and Muir Central College, Allahabad for his degrees. He served as a Special Magistrate for over twenty years and in 1953 he was elected President of the Naini Tal Municipal Board — a post which he held with honour and integrity. He was ever ready to help St. Joseph's in every possible way and gave every encouragement to us in building the swimming pool with the assurance that as long as he was Chairman, St. Joseph's would have no problem with water. A large number of people joined his funeral procession. Shops, commercial establishments and educational institutions were closed as a mark of respect to his memory. The entire Staff and student body of St. Joseph's offer their sympathy to his widow, daughter and son who is himself a past pupil of St. Joseph's.

Edmund Ignatius Rice

Founder of the Christian Brothers

For the vast majority of our readers the name Edmund Ignatius Rice and for that matter The Christian Brothers means very little. How common it is that we know so very little of the great people of the world who, by their endeavours, have changed the history of nations. Among the outstanding men of this time was one whose name will live for ever in the hearts of his followers and in all who have the good of the youth of the world at heart.

Edmund Rice was born in the village of Callan, Co. Kilkenny in Ireland on June 1st 1762. Edmund grew up like any other lad in the district full of life and fun. Both himself and his brothers were keen sportsmen, but life was not all fun and games and Edmund had also to attend to the serious business of his schooling. Notwithstanding the lack of educational facilities for Catholic Irish youth in the late 18th century Edmund Rice was a well educated man. His earliest education was given by his mother. This was supplemented by the instructions of an Augustinian friar, Father Patrick Grace. Later Edmund and his brothers attended the Mount Lane Pay school. There he showed such promise that when he was fourteen years of age the decision was made to send him to school in the county capital of Kilkenny. Here he was to receive an education well above the average for a Catholic boy of his day. Edmund had almost reached his eighteenth year when his uncle Michael, a prosperous merchant in the city of Waterford, decided to offer him a place in his business. In a remarkably short time Edmund became so proficient in his work that he was handed over the complete charge of the export-and-ship-suppliers trade by his uncle. Because of his business contacts and as a result of his kindly, friendly personality, Edmund entered into the full social life of his time; he was in the full bloom of manhood; prospects were bright and he looked to the future with confidence and hope. When he was 23 years of age he married, but his biographer has left us only meagre information of this event of his life. They settled down to a happy married life but this blissful state was marred by a sad accident. One day while Edmund and his wife were out horse-riding his wife was thrown from her horse. She survived only a week after this accident. Her death left Edmund heart-broken and it seemed to him that his world had collapsed about him. This was but the beginning of trials and crosses which were to test this young man and were the prelude to a fuller life devoted entirely to the service of his neighbour, his church and his God.

While Edmund continued his commercial activities with ever-growing success, he began to devote more time to prayer and reading of the scriptures.

Edmund's intensive spiritual life and devoted apostolate matured for him the initial grace of a religious vocation, even though how this would be fulfilled was not yet clear. The idea of joining a religious society had been occupying his mind and he intended going to the continent for this purpose. He confided his wish to some of his friends who advised him that it would be better for him to stay at home and devote himself and his money to educating the poor boys of his adopted city, many of whom roamed the streets and were a terror to the people of Waterford. He sold his business and looked for a site in which to begin his great work. "Everything was adverse; everywhere was difficulty, but in Edmund Rice there was the happy combination of those noble qualities which eminently fitted him for the gigantic action, made him consider not the magnitude of the obstacles but the means of overcoming them. He had made his decision and there could be no further delay. In a barely-furnished room he opened his first school and with 40 unruly boys he laid the foundations of that society whose system of education has spread over the world through the instrumentality of the society he formed. At this time it was required that a prospective teacher take an Oath of allegiance to the British Sovereign. He applied for a licence but this was refused, but after a great deal of trouble it was eventually obtained for him. He was now 40 years and he must have often asked himself if he were too old to begin teaching. It was a hard life and he had no special training for it. After some time he was joined by other charitable men who, on seeing the good work he was doing, offered to help him, but many of them deserted him after a short time as they found the work too difficult. However, in his darkest hour, God did not abandon him, and while some left, others joined and he was able to form the nucleus of a society later to be known as The Christian Brothers. On August 15th 1808, Edmund Rice and his companions who now numbered nine were clothed in religious habits by the Bishop of Waterford. They pronounced their religious vows. This was really a historic day for Edmund. How trivial now seemed all the trials and sacrifices that had gone before. Now he was consecrated to God and to the service of his fellow men.

Edmund Rice's society now grew from strength to strength and schools were started in other towns and cities of Ireland as soon as his men were sufficiently trained in both spiritual and secular knowledge. The entire day of the Brothers was taken up with teaching, prayer, study, visits to the hospitals and prisons as well as helping the weaker students if time allowed. After some time the society spread to England where a number of schools was opened. By 1844, when Br. Rice died, the society was well established in that country. In the course of time schools were also opened in many countries, India being one of them. It might interest our readers to learn that the city of Calcutta claims the distinction of being the first city in India to have a school started by the Christian Brothers. Today there are three schools there. During a period of almost forty years Brother Rice had been the leader and guardian of the Brothers, now at the advanced age of 76 years.

and with failing health he resigned the office of Superior General of the Order in 1838. The Government passed to younger hands. He retired to his beloved Mount Zion in Waterford — the cradle of the Congregation — where he devoted the remainder of his time to intensive prayer, penance and works of charity. During this time he suffered a great deal but always with wonderful patience. Eventually to add to his other sufferings, his sight failed him. He passed away peacefully at 11 a.m. on the 29th of August 1844 at the age of 62 to receive the reward promised to those who "do and teach". After his death this man who so shunned publicity in life was accorded the universal praise of Catholics and Non-Catholics alike, at national as well as local level. His admirers in Waterford erected a chapel and a classroom at Mt. Zion in 1845 — a fitting and symbolic tribute to his memory. Immediately the society began to spread and schools were soon established in Australia, the Americas, Africa, Gibraltar, New Zealand, West India, Rome and India — among the latter being our own St. Joseph's College here which was opened in 1888. At present we have thirteen Primary and Secondary Schools, one College, one Orphanage and two Technical Schools here in India. In 1944 the centenary of the death of the founder was kept across the world. In 1961 the Archbishop of Dublin opened the first stage of the cause of Canonization and in 1976 his cause was transferred to Rome to await the final decision of the Church. This then is a very brief account of the man who did so much for the education of youth and whose followers are still doing throughout the world.

Old Boys

He was recently crowned Gwalior Prince here in Bangalore and finished runner-up in the All India Contest. He has two brothers Walter and Michael. Walter is a Sales Executive with Godfrey Philips India and is posted at Bhuvanagar in Saurashtra doing very well at his job. He left S.J.C. in '67. Michael who left St. Joseph's in '68 is now a Captain in the army and has bright career prospects.

Bros Connolly and Mockler were Principals during my time. I did my Senior Cambridge and Inner Arts and then went on to St. John's College Agra where I did my B.Com. After leaving Agra, I tried my hand in Military Accounts Department and later on at poultry farming. Ultimately, I also took over my portion of the family property and have a small farm some twenty-eight miles from Meerut. The fourth Pooch was Brian Michael. He was there during the late 30s and after completing his Senior Cambridge, did a technical course in the railway workshops at Jamalpur. Eventually he joined the India Steamship Co. and by dint of hard work and ability rose to the position of Chief Engineer. He left India in the

late forties and is now settled down in South Shields in England with a shore job with the same firm. The last Pooch up to the time of writing to enter St. Joseph's was Anthony Adler, the son of George Eustace who joined in the late fifties. He did his Senior Cambridge and thereafter secured admission to an Agricultural College in Davis California where he studied for many years, eventually getting a Doctorate in Pomology. Shortly after, he got work with M/s Union Carbide of the U. S. A. and the latest report is that he is doing very well with them.

The 89th Annual Athletic Meet

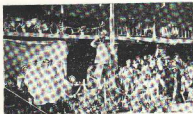
At St. Joseph's—1976

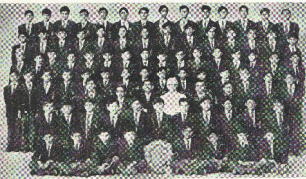

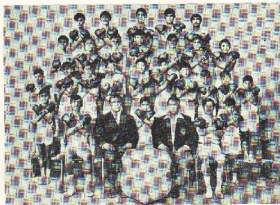

A Freak Storm Hits Naini Tal

On the 7th of October, Naini Tal was hit by a freak storm. Throughout the day the sky was covered with thick, black clouds, which heralded bad weather. Then all of a sudden at 3.30 p.m., when all the boys were on their fields playing football, the storm started with claps of thunder and some awe-inspiring lightning.

Strong winds swept through the college blowing away clouds of dust from the fields. At first no one paid much attention to the wind as it was thought to be ordinary gusts of wind, which are quite common in Naini Tal. But the speed of the storm increased (which was later on estimated at 80 km.p.h.) so the games were stopped and the boys gathered in the quadrangle.

As our school is situated on the top of a hill, it was directly in the path of the gale which had devastating effects. Many galvanised sheets were torn off; these were flying all over the school and proved very dangerous. Most damage was caused to the chapel, which is the oldest part of the building in the school. The major part of the roof was blown away and a concrete turret fell from near the bellry on to the cemented quadrangle below, sinking to a depth of a few inches. The roof of the boys' toilets was also damaged and the pillars supporting it were shaken from their original position. In the town also there was widespread destruction and many trees were uprooted and electric poles knocked down. However, the Electrical department got working and soon the light was restored.

Along with the strong winds, we also had a few light showers of rain which reduced the temperature considerably and it became very cold. The boys who were still in their games clothes were sent to the lockers to put on some warm clothing and then went into the study hall. A feeling of uneasiness and fear was evident among the smaller boys but the calm presence of the Brothers and the teachers restored their confidence once again, and soon the situation was well under control.

By about 5.15 p.m. the wind subsided; the sky cleared and the sun shone brightly. The boys came out to inspect the damage. Some boys helped in gathering up sheets which were lying all over the first field.

Yet in spite of the fact that we are perched on top of the hill, we escaped comparatively lightly. When we recall what a storm of such velocity could have done to us, we thank God that nobody was injured. We hope never to experience such a storm again.
