He arrived in Calcutta in 1930 and was one of the last batches of Brothers who sailed up the Hoogly. He and his companions had left Liverpool over a month previously and were happy when they were once more in the company of their Brothers in St. Joseph's, Calcutta. Whether it be on the heights of the Himalayas or in the sweltering plains, he gave of his best. His name will be cherished long by the orphans of St. Mary's, Dum Dum, where he was Principal and where he worked so untiringly to improve the lot of those children who did not have much of this world's goods. The even tenor of his way was shown, not only when he was Principal of St. Patrick's, Asansol and St. John's, Chandigarh, but in the classrooms of our schools all over India, where he taught with a zeal "that could not tire" and which showed no diminution with the passing of years. I am sure many of his pupils will breathe a prayer that this Brother will be spared for many more years to carry on the work of educating the youth of this country which he set out to do when he came to its shores forty seven years ago.

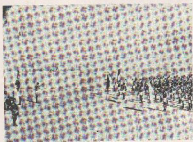
Cdr. B.B. Singh, I.N. inducts the athletes before declaring the meet open.

Eventually the 28th of May arrived and with it the eager anticipation of another marvellous sports' day such as Sen has always witnessed. Drill clothes

were ironed, beds were whitened, bunting fluttered in the light breeze, the newly laid tracks which had been recently rolled shone, all gave promise of a first class athletic meet. His Excellency Dr. Channa Reddy had tried to come to Naini Tal for the occasion but his duties compelled him to remain for a few days longer in Lucknow. However, Mr. R.S. Jhri, IAS, the Commissioner, Kumaon Division, Naini Tal, kindly agreed to preside at the function and Mrs. Jhri was to give away the prizes.

Shortly after lunch some visitors started arriving but by this time, the breeze had died down and the sunshine was replaced by black, heavy clouds. Promptly at 2 p.m. the Commissioner arrived and everyone hoped against hope that the rain would keep off. As there was a slight drizzle, it was decided to wait for a while before beginning the march past. A minute later the rain came

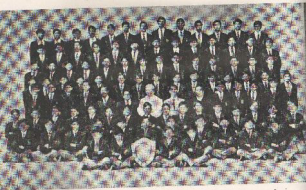

Aquatic Meet

Soon after the sports holidays ended the boys looked forward to the swimming season. Within a week the pool was cleaned and filled with fresh clean water, thus starting the swimming season.

The weather, as usual, was bad but it didn't lessen the enthusiasm of the swimmers who turned out regularly for swimming practice inspite of the cold. After vigorous practice and various tests many of them qualified for the 'deep end', and were recognised among the 'strong' swimmers. The boys in turn, improved upon their strokes and daily swam a number of lengths to gain stamina.

The week passed quickly with the elimination of the weaker swimmers and by the end of the week only about eighteen major events remained for the final day. The most interesting of these was the Inter House Water Polo final between Gandhi and Tagore House. Gandhi House

were the hot favourites before the match, because previously they had won all their league matches, but Tagore being the weaker team was cheered by all. The match finally started and the Tagore House team played with much determination and went on to win the match, with an impressive margin, to lift the Br. 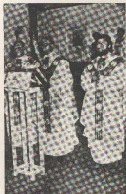

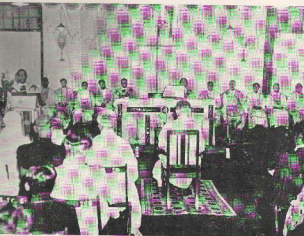

In the bout between V.K. Sah and R. Bagadia, both boxers displayed great skill and style but V.K. Sah

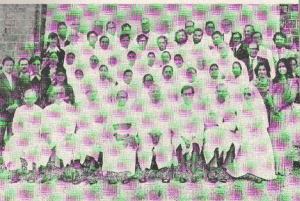
