


May 14th OFFICIAL OPENING OF SPORTS

Lt. Col. Dhawan came to the College to officially open the Sports.




The boys, smartly dressed in their House colours, were inspected by the Chief Guest, who then took the salute at the March Past of the four different houses.


The Flats—venue for both the tournaments—resounded with our cheers as we encouraged our teams twice, and sometimes thrice, a week.





After waiting for what seemed a long time the final day eventually came. There was excitement all over the school and boys could be seen encouraging the swimmers who had events that day.






TEACHERS' DAY CONCERT


2nd November.







My name is Henry Azevedo and I am an ex-pupil of two Irish Christian Brothers Schools. I first joined St. Patrick's High School, Assam in January 1939 in Standard 4. Unfortunately St. Pat's, St. Vincent's and the neighbouring Convent were closed in March 1942 when the Government made them all into Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for troops injured by the Japanese in Burma. From my days in St. Pat's I remember Brother Titus Chandler as the Principal, Brother Augustine as Prefect and I was taught by Brother Gero, Brother Gabriel Mulcahy and Brother Severin Murphy.

I then joined St. Francis de Sales High School in Nagpur where I finished my Senior Cambridge and came back to the Christian Brothers in St. Joseph's College, Naini Tal to do my Inter Science. This was in March 1947. Brother T.A. Murphy was in charge of us, "Specs" (for specials) as we were called, and by a coincidence Brother Severin Murphy was in charge of the Senior Cambridge Class. I remember Brothers Connelly, Athanasius Comber and Athanasius O'Shea among other Brothers.

We had a pretty rowdy class. Lionel Pereira was with me and he later joined the Indian Navy and we did our training with the Royal Navy together. Jack Dias was another and he joined the Army. St. Joseph's has every reason to be very proud of Jack as he became a highly skilled Mountaineer and led the First Indian team which attempted Everest. Unfortunately Jack died a few years ago of Leukemia, cutting short a thoroughly adventurous life. What I remember best about St. Joseph's are the many hikes we did to Cheena Peak, the Lakes around and the races on the lake. Jack Dias, Michael (Spud) Murphy, Bernard (Barmy) Burke and I were always out on most holidays from early morning to late evening on Hikes and I also remember the delicious packed snacks we were given by Mrs. (Ma) Cotton or was it 'Mo' Green. You boys, now in St. Joseph's, are lucky to have a swimming pool, but I think we were luckier to have our own changing rooms by the lake, our own raft moored in the lake and our own dinghy to tip over as soon as some one was in it. I vividly remember the rivalry with Sherwood, the dashes on Saturdays in what is now the roller-skating rink and the supreme thrill when for the first time ever 'Sem' beat the top team (Heroes or Golden something) in the finals of the hockey tournament on the "Flats". But most of all I remember the SPIRIT of 'Sem', that wonderful spirit which made each of us proud to belong to the best. An example of this was the following incident. On the way back from the Annual A.F.I. Camp it was pouring "cats

"dogs" and we were soaking wet as we marched back. The Sherwood troop came into town out of step, completely dejected and despirited, whereas, as we came near town, we all fell into step and marched in as though on ceremonial parade, everyone singing one of our marching songs. I am sure each of you will cherish this spirit and keep it proudly alight.

After completing my Inter, I was selected to join Indian Navy and joined HMS Bahadur in Karachi in May 1947 for initial training before going to UK. I sailed from India on August 10, 1947 and we celebrated Independence Day at sea. I was away from India for six and a half years and during this time I was in the Royal Indian Naval College at Dartmouth and the Royal Naval Engineering College at Plymouth. In between I was aboard HMS Devonshire and on our first cruise, we visited Jamaica, Cadet on Barbados, Trinidad, most of the West Indian islands and also touched Belize in British Honduras in Central America. On the second, we visited Oslo, Kristiansand (South) Stockholm. In the latter I was interviewed by the Swedish radio and the interviewer asked me about India and insisted that I say I was surprised not to find snow in Sweden at that time. I tried to tell him, from my Geography lessons, I knew fully well there could not be snow in August, but he would not listen and I had to make that statement on the radio! While in Stockholm it was the King's birthday and I was in the battalion of Cadets who joined the Swedish troops in marching through the streets and then lining them. I was the only Indian in the contingent and the Swedish Press enjoyed themselves photographing my brown face—in 1948 Brown faces were still rare in the Continent!

I was lucky to have served on board one of the last battleships afloat, HMS "King George V". A lovely ship which took the major part in the great sea battle against the German battleship "Bismarck" and helped "sink the Bismarck". While in England I toured quite a lot and visited Clangeriff and Bantry Bay in Ireland. This was in 1948 when everything was rationed in England in the aftermath of the War and eggs, butter and jam were unobtainable. Four English cadets and I had gone for a hike in the lovely Irish countryside and stopped at a farm house for tea. The good lady must have been surprised out of her wits to see us eat eggs, bread and butter like we had never seen these before and, truth to tell, we had not! I also visited Paris and Switzerland on holidays and I joined the Royal Navy Ski Club for two winter holidays skiing in Australia. Good old days.

In between courses in RNCC we had to spend one year at sea to get our Engine-room Watchkeeping Certificate and Lionel Pereira (ex 'Sem') and I were sent to an aircraft carrier, HMS Unicorn in the Far East. This was during the Korean War and we did several patrols in the War zone when our planes took off to strafe or bomb the enemy troops and depots. We visited several cities in Japan, Hongkong, Singapore, Colombo and Kandy (to see the famous Buddhist shrine the "Temple of the Tooth". While in Japan I visited Hiroshima — this was in 1952, only seven years after the Atom Bomb was dropped—and saw the ruined Library and the Atom Bomb Centre. The town had been re-built except for the Library and we spoke to elderly people who had been in the city when the bomb exploded. Their experiences were pretty horrible.

After completing my training I returned to India in January 1954 and after that I served in various ships and establishments, INS Kisan (now Krishna), Bombay, Tir, Delhi, Rajput, Dharini and ashore in Lonavla, Visakhapatnam and Bombay.

I retired from the Navy in 1972 and joined the new fertilizer plant, ZAC Agro Chemicals Ltd. in Goa. Here the life is quite different from that in the Navy and it is a new challenge. ZAC is one of the newest plants in India, and since starting production in May 1973 we hit high production figures and in 1977-78 we were among the top 5 plants in the country. We produce 600 tonnes/day Ammonia, all of which is used to produce 1140 tonnes/day of Urea and between 500 to 600 tonnes/day of complex fertilizer (nitrogen, potash and phosphorous). I am the Senior Industrial Engineer in charge of the Planning Department. So after all my travels and service life I have now settled down in Goa.

I was married in 1956 and we have 4 children. The eldest is doing her B.Ed degree after B.A., the second her final B.Sc., the third her first year of Junior College and the youngest, our son, has just appeared for SSC (Xth). I am very proud to say that he will also be an ex-Christian Brother's boy because he will pass out from Regis Mundi, the Christian Brothers School in Goa. Brother Hayes is the Principal now and before him was Brother Finn. We have Brothers Mulligan and Slattery here together with Brothers T. Pinto, and Drego.

I always wanted to return to Naini Tal for a holiday because I consider it one of the prettiest spots in the world, and I was very glad when Brother Kyle arranged for us to spend a few days in May 1978 in St. Francis Home. All of us thoroughly enjoyed our holidays and all my

family members were duly impressed by the towering facade of "Sam" and all that was inside. I was really happy to meet Brothers Severin Murphy, Athanasius Comber but the highlight of my visit was when Brother Kyle asked me to declare the Annual Sports Meet open. Luckily he did not ask me to say a few words because there was a big lump in my throat when I thought of the number of times I played hockey and football and even took part in 100 m and hurdles on the same ground.

To conclude, I may add that my younger brother Noel Azevedo also joined me in St. Patrick's Asansol and later followed me to St. Joseph's Naini Tal. He joined the Dufferin (now Rajendra) and became a Master in the Merchant Navy. Later he was a Pilot in Madras Harbour and in 1966 he went to Canada where he is Chief Officer (soon to be Master) on one of the ferries in Vancouver. He is married with 3 children. The eldest is doing Electronic Engineering, the second Computer Technology and the youngest is in Grade 9.


