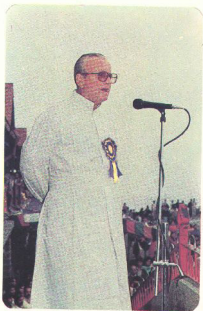
Here come the naughty, merry boys of S.I.C., running and playing along the road.. Some talk merrily while others run races and play games.

Children Meet Scientists

Sir C.V. Raman was born on the 7th November, 1898. He was the pioneer of modern science in India and it was chiefly because of him that our country received international awards in scientific fields. For his concept on the defraction of light called 'Raman Effect', Professor Raman received the Nobel Prize in Physics on the 28th of February, 1930.

In honour of Raman's birth centenary celebrations, a programme was organised by the National Council of Education, Research and Training (NCERT) to educate the young students about the latest developments in the research work done by our scientists. Hence, some interested students from each Educational Institution of our town were invited to visit the various Departments of the Science



Faculty of Kumaon University, Naini Tal on the 20th of March, 1990. We met Professor S.S. Pant, 71, who was the first Vice-Chancellor of the Kumaon University, Naini Tal.

Then we were taken to the laboratory and were shown the Spectrophotometer. It is the instrument used for the determination of the absorption spectra of liquids. If the radiation is detected with the eye, then the device used is the Spectroscope. If a photographic plate is used to detect the radiation, the device is the Spectrograph. If some type of phototube or other electronic detector is used, the instrument is referred to as a Spectrophotometer. Some more instruments have detectors and they give a signal, which can be electrically amplified and presented as a recording on a chart. This instrument is known as the Spectrometer.

There were also facilities to produce a spectrum exactly like that of the Sun. This is very useful for the researchers as the spectrum of the sun is available for their research work even when the weather conditions are unfavourable. After this, we saw the monochromator. A beam carrying the radiation of only one discrete wavelength is said to be monochromatic and the instrument by which we can obtain this beam of discrete wavelength is known as a monochromator. A monochromator is quite useful in studying the properties of a monochromatic beam.

We were then shown a laser beam of .5 milliwatt, and were told about its various applications. Treatment of diseases and calculating very long distances are among its important uses. A liquid-air plant was also shown to us. In this, the air was changed into water by the process of liquefaction. When operating, the

temperature in this plant was maintained at-193°C. We were next taken to the Chemistry Department. Here, we were first introduced to some of the Professors of this Department.

We were given the demonstration of the Column Chromatography technique. By this process, separation of the various constituents of the plant species and other matters can be done, and observed. We also saw the working of the Gas Chromatograph. This is a very sophisticated instrument and is computer-controlled. It is used for the identification of the species present in gases even in very small amounts. Here, the percentage of the various constituents can also be calculated. Then, we saw the high precision Liquid Chromatography instrument.

We were also shown the Ultra-Violet, the Visible and the Infra-Red Spectrophotometer. Then in the Botany Department, we saw the various microscopic organisms under powerful microscopes. We also saw the Nitrogen Analyzer by which various experiments are conducted on different types of soils.

In the Zoology Department, we were shown the complete procedure of making permanent slides of the various parts of the living beings. We also saw the various parts of a human kidney under a very powerful microscope.

After that, we went to the Geology Department, and there we had a short break of about forty minutes, in which we had tea and snacks.

After this break, Professor K.S. Valdia, the Head of the Department told us about the various areas in which research work is being carried out. What we generally call stones and regard as useless have great value for these geologists. They are called rock-constituents and are composed of various minerals and inorganic

substances. To examine a rock constituent, its slide is first made. In this process, they are cut into fine pieces and a chip is made. This chip of the rock constituent, by various processes of grinding and smoothening, is almost made transparent. Then it is examined under a microscope for its detailed study.

We were told, and also shown, that if two identical photographs are placed side by side and the left photograph is seen with the left eye and the right one with the right eye, then a three-dimensional image of the photograph can be seen. We were also given information about the Land Use Satellites, run by National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), U.S.A., which use Infra-Red Ultra-violet Rays for taking photographs.

We were also shown the Additive Colour Viewer, in which four identical photograph negatives are used. They are placed close to each other and the photographs could be coloured according to one's desire. There, the Differential Thermal Analyzer was used to study the properties of metals at different temperatures.

After this we were taken to the main hall, where some leading scientists and educationists were already present. Among the prominent ones were Dr. Venkat Srinivas from Lucknow; Dr. Sanive Sarkar; Dr. V. Vijayan from Hyderabad; and Dr. Sukumar Ver from Baroda.

There Professor K.S. Valdie first delivered a speech on nature and environment and ways in which they are beneficial to us. Then short lectures were delivered by the various invited people.

The main topic of the lectures was 'The Greening of the Earth'. After this, Dr. T.D. Pant of the Physics Department gave a vivid description of the life history and the scientific achievements

of Professor Raman.

At about 5.30 p.m., the meeting ended. We returned home with an exciting and educational day's memory, which we can not forget in the years to follow.

Analysis of Laughter

We can write it in the following manner :

$$\frac{1 (x-y)}{x-y} = \frac{100 (x-y)}{x-y}$$

However, the very first and second steps of this theory say that

$$x-y = 0$$

Hence the actual procedure is :

$$\frac{1 (x-y)}{0} = \frac{100 (x-y)}{0}$$

We know that when any number is divided by '0' then the result is an unreal number or it is not defined.

Thus, the result of this equation are two unreal numbers. This is simply playing with numbers.

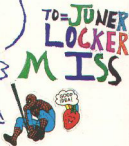

Needless to say our efforts were appreciated and we were proud and happy.

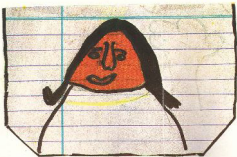

For more than 50 years I have been hanging just outside the Study Hall. Down those long years, I have learned a lot. I have seen thousands of boys passing under me. They were of all classes and kind-some big and very big; some small. I have seen Indian boys and European boys come and go to the study hall. Many



boys come noisily to quench their thirst at the drinking water taps, close by me.

In the morning, aroused from sleep, hundreds of boys rush down those wide stairs. They make a deafening noise in their struggle to be first. I study the faces of these boys. The "smallies" are quite cheerful, but the majority are dejected and depressed. And reaching out for a straw, a boy from another class asks: "Is our master coming to class?" "Oh yes!" He is very healthy and strong." "Don't I know!"

Just below me I hear the loud throb of an engine. This is the generator which supplies electricity when outside power fails. Many boys regret the coming of that machine--no chance to escape evening study!

I see a few boys standing outside the hall in the evening. They were talking at study time. They are glum and depressed and they pray that no one sees them. They hasten in when at last they are allowed back to the fold.

I have had to undergo repairs on a few occasions. Once my tongue broke and I was not able to give any tinkle or sound. Bari Mistri and his helpers were along in no time. They removed my tongue and took it away to mend it. Next day it was put back and this was many years ago and since then, it has endured multiple blows after the rope broke but that was a long time ago. It was repaired in no time.

Class 100

History of Yachting

Author's Note:- In May 1900, the Centenary of Yachting was celebrated in Walmal Tal. This article is written to commemorate the Centenary Celebration.



Yachting made a beginning in 1588 in the reign of Queen Elizabeth. Not much is known of yachting until the 19th Century. About this time there came the nouveau rich as England was becoming an Industrial nation and people had more money to spend. The Royal Yacht Club was founded in 1815. Its name was changed in 1830 to Royal Yacht Squadron. Regattas became popular in England when the first royal cup was given by William IV to the Royal Yacht Squadron. Later Yacht racing became very popular in France and the U.S.A..

The decade between 1870 and 1890 may be termed the Golden Age of Yachting. Of races there was a plethora; indeed no less than 400 matches took place in 1876, as against 63 matches in 1856. The sport too was better regulated, and was conducted on a uniform system: the Yacht-Racing Association, established in 1815, drew up a simple code of law for the regulation of yacht races, which was accepted by the yacht clubs generally throughout the world.

Yachting was introduced in the Olympics in the year 1900, when there were races in the 6 m, 8 m and more than 10 m classes, categories which are no longer used. There was no yachting at the St. Louis Games in 1904, but it returned in London

In 1908. It has governed this sport very effectively since then. Pleasure yachting became increasingly popular, especially after Second World War.

The Yachting Club of India: Yachting was introduced in India by the British and the first yacht club was established in Bombay in 1846. The name of this club was the Royal Bombay Yacht Club and its entrance fee in those days used to be Rs.400. The next yacht club was also founded in Bombay in 1882 and its name was the Bombay Sailing Association. The earliest records of sailing on the Naini Tal lake date back to 1880, when the yachts sailed were of the cutter type with lead keels. This was the first time when yachting was introduced at a high altitude. About this time, Fleetwood Williams, I.C.S. Commissioner of Meerut, built a Schooner yacht at St. Asaphs and launched it on the lake by means of a trolley. A twin hulled boat, 'Gemini' was also built and sailed by Colonel Henry, whilst Messrs Murray and Company imported three Belfast Lough type sailing boats, called 'Coya', 'Doodles' and 'Dorothy' and let them out here for several years. Sailing as a sport was started in Naini Tal in 1898.

The Naini Tal Sailing Club was started in 1897. The type of vessel used was the skimming dish or 'Sarceness' type. The well known 'Wave'(See built) was of this class, and held her own for many years. Several yachts such as 'Spray' and 'Shells' were locally built to compete with her, without much success.

In 1910, the Naini Tal Yacht Club was formed on the initiative of the Carey brothers, C.W. Carey, a major in the Guides, and F. Carey, a captain in the Royal Artillery. Its name was entered in the Lloyds Register of Yachts in 1911. Those days the Naini Tal Yacht Club had a fleet of nine yachts designed by Linton Hope and built by Turks and Co. of Kingston-on-Thames.

It was affiliated to the Yacht Rowing Association and those days had a membership of some 250 who were scattered all over India. The entrance fee was Rs.30 with a monthly subscription of Rs.10 per member. For temporary members, the fee was Rs.15. The first commodore of the club was Sir W. Malcolm Malley, G.C.I.E., K.C.B., I., I.C.S. and the vice-commodore was Lt. Col. C.W. Carey. In 1940 the club was taken over by the Indians and that year the commodore was Sir Francis Verner Wyle and the vice-commodore was Col. C.W. Carey. In 1961 for the first time an Indian, Raja Hari Chand Raj Singh, was appointed the rear commodore of the club and in 1967, Raj Kumar Giri Raj Singh was appointed as the first Indian commodore of the club.

In 1911, the Royal Madras Yatch Club also came into existence. The Bhopal Yacht Club was established in 1914 and in 1936 the Bangalore Sailing Club was founded.
