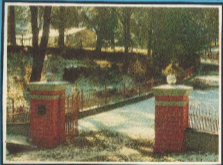

St. Joseph's, Nainital : Far From The Madding Crowd

High on an isolated plateau surrounded by hills and dense green foliage stands the august building of St. Joseph's College, Nainital. Here, amidst the serenity of nature, the sons of the saintly Edmund Ignatius Rice—the Christian Brothers—have been quietly toiling for the past 89 years, imparting the unique education they are so famous for to hundreds of students from all walks of life.

Towards the end of last month, I happened to spend a few hours in the company of the Christian Brothers at St. Joseph's, Nainital. It was a very happy moment for me since I had also been a student under the Christian Brothers when they managed St. Michael's High School, Kurji (which completed 125 years of its existence two years ago).

I had the opportunity of meeting my gurus of yester-years, Brs. D.F. Burke, Comber and Lyng. These great teachers have been responsible for moulding my early life and the lives of hundreds of boys from various parts of the country.

My masters have grown old externally but the spirit of youthfulness continues to emit from their personalities and you can't mistake the brightness of those smiling Irish eyes when a Brother speaks to you.

St. Joseph's is one of 21 schools managed by the Christian Brothers in India. It was founded in 1888 by Rev. Dr. Pasci who handed over the building to the Brothers in 1892.

Since then they have extended the school buildings and now occupy over four hectares of land. The buildings are well planned. In fact this is one of the most prominent buildings in the Nainital area.

It stands high on a plateau some 150 metres above the Naini Lake which is one of the most picturesque spots in Nainital. Its twin towers can be seen from far. The entire atmosphere reminds one of the scenes described by Thomas Hardy in many of his novels.

The present principal, Br. Donohue, CFC, was so kind as to take us around the buildings. As we moved from one block to another a bunch

of clouds got together and surrounded the entire area. In a short while we experienced a heavy downpour.

The Brothers manage a school which caters to 60 percent of the local people. Besides a large number of boys as day-scholars, they have about 300 boarders who come from neighbouring countries, such as Malaysia, Thailand and the U.A.E.

I saw a large number of Catholic boys from Calcutta who, the Principal explained, are sons of past pupils of the various schools run by the Brothers.

One of the most peaceful and beautiful places in the school was the Chapel. It looked so much like the one they had in St. Michael's, Kurji.

The dormitories were neat and clean. Nuns managed the junior dorm, while the middle and senior dorms are looked after by the Brothers, just like in any other Christian Brothers school.

The Brothers uphold the policy, "Mens Sana in Corpore Sano" (a healthy mind in a healthy body). To emphasise this, they have built six spacious playgrounds, eight tennis courts and a swimming pool.

They also have a boathouse in the Nainital Lake with a fleet of racers and rowboats. Facilities for games like billiards, squash, etc. are also available.

The study room, auditorium and dining room arouse envy. In brief, it can be said that St. Joseph's College is an ideal place where young people can really enjoy going to school.

Every boy has ample opportunity to develop the qualities of a perfect citizen. Influenced by the school motto, "Certe Bonum Certamen" (Fight the Good Fight) the boys are taught by both precept and example the lessons of truth, chivalry and manliness.

I have had the opportunity to visit other Christian Brother schools and everywhere I went I found the same magic—the same charm and dedication I experienced during my schooling in good old St. Mike's.

Economics Exhibition

The Exhibition was opened by our Principal. There was great excitement all round. Soon students from neighbouring schools arrived. The girls were inclined to be a bit fidgety and no matter how much they tried to get us into a tight corner with their extraordinary questioning, they could not succeed in their attempts. The replies to the questions put forward by the inquisitive guests came with ease and confidence from us.

There were about 45 exhibits on display with charts to bring out the state of Indian economy in the most vivid manner. Though it was difficult to say which model was the best, certain ones were rated high for their great effect. The models were the admiration of all the visitors and great praise is due to the boys and to Mr Irwin for making this Exhibition the great success that it was.

The Influence of T.V. on Young People

TV is a most important means of communication. It brings scenes from all parts of the world into homes. And so people can learn a lot about other lands. TV can take people into space as it did when Armstrong and Aldrin landed on the moon.

TV provides a great deal of entertainment, f.e. sports, dramas, light comedies, cartoon, quiz and many motion pictures. They show plays about cowboys, detectives, doctors and lawyers. There are also variety shows which include comedians, dancers and singers. Again we get documentaries on TV which present non-fictional information. These include descriptions of historical places, life in its many forms, the great damage done by indiscriminate felling of trees, by floods and earthquakes and many more.

Closed circuit TV is of great value in many ways. In closed-circuit TV signals are sent only to certain sets. This is of great value in education; and hospital use to monitor the condition of patients. In banks and jails and super-markets, TV enables guards to watch many people at once. These are only some of the benefits of "the blessing from afar", i.e. TV.

Let us see the influence that TV has on the young. No doubt they derive great benefit from it and in many ways it is a blessing, rather a mixed blessing. Many TV programmes show scenes of violence. These may cause viewers, especially youngsters to act violently themselves. Again TV often shows those who live more glamorous lives and have more material possessions than most viewers. This may be helpful and may encourage people to work harder to get the things they want. But these can also cause young people to become so dissatisfied with their lives that the result is unhappiness. - This may cause them to become angry and take to violent behaviour.

Again, entertainment on TV is often of a very poor quality. It can be really vulgar in matters of sex and behaviour. It often gives false ideas of life to young people in glorifying violence, in degrading sex. In this way it can damage the morals of youngsters. Apart from the spiritual and moral harm caused by TV, it has physical disadvantages too. Viewing TV for long periods and at a short distance can cause people to absorb harmful rays from it; it can also damage the eyesight. TV is the greatest means of communication ever invented and used properly can be a great source of knowledge of all kinds.

The Computers of S. J. C.

It was a fine, bright morning, in the middle of the sport's holidays. Of the few boys left behind, only two were from class X, about six from class IX and the rest scattered among the remaining classes. Altogether, there were only thirty or so boys staying back.

On that morning of the 3rd of June, the Principal made a request for a few volunteers from the seniormost classes. As the only two remaining class X boys weren't available, all the class IX boys present went.

Previous to the Annual Athletic Meet, Mr. Sanyal, father of Rana Sanyal, studying here in class VII, had arrived here. He was the gentleman responsible for obtaining a computer set-up for the College. He was waiting here for the computers to arrive. In the meanwhile he made arrangements for them with the Principal.

So, that fine day we followed him and the Principal down to Tallital. The computers had arrived there and we were to help carry them to college. Along with them, two technicians had arrived from the company to set them up.

There were eighteen boxes in all. These contained seven Eiko Primer terminals, seven monitors, one Eiko II main terminal, one dot printer, one twin floppy drive and one large voltage stabilizer. These were all from Eiko.

All this was set up in the old Catechism room, which was now out of use. The two tables used for the drinks' stall were used. Special platforms were made for the monitors and the printer by Bari. He also made three boards for the walls, on which notices could be put up. All the electrical connections were made by two electricians. We helped too, and put all our efforts in carrying the tables and a cupboard and we really put our muscles into the task of shifting in the linoleum for the floor. Finally the two technicians, Mr. Venket and Mr. Sahni, installed the actual equipment.

Quite soon, we got everything moving smoothly. A few temporary incharges were selected from classes VIII and IX. More than once, we had to run down to town to get a few necessary items for the set-up.

A few days before the holidays ended Mr. Venket and Mr. Sahni left. Soon after that our computer instructor arrived. His name was Mr. Ranjan

Pathak. He was quite a young man, in his early twenties or so, but he proved to be an excellent teacher and an expert at the keyboard. Along with Mr. Sanyal, he spent the remaining days of the holidays making programs for official use. The day after the holidays ended, both of them left for Delhi.

By then, the number of incharges had been reduced to three, all from class IX. They were Leon Higginson, Sanjeev Kumar and myself. Of these, I was the chief and kept the keys till Mr. Pathak returned. Till then, we allowed the boys to play the video games we had.

After Mr. Pathak returned, nothing much could be done as the First Terminal Examinations were drawing near. During the exam week, the computer room remained closed. Soon after they finished, our preliminary course in computer sciences got under way for classes VIII, IX and X.

It is nearly five months now since the computers were installed. We now have another monitor for the seventh Eiko Primer terminal and a new printer. The preliminary BASIC course is complete and we have had an examination on it. All the boys who pass will go on for the advanced course. For class X it will be optional as the course is for one year.

Our set-up has improved considerably. We have built up a reasonable library of books on computers and the students have contributed over two hundred programs, plenty of them of quite good standard. Two new incharges have also been added. They are Sanjeet Kumar and Amit Chaudhary.

This computer set-up has benefitted the college a lot. Not only are the students getting first-hand knowledge and experience on computers but the administration is also using them to perform a multitude of functions. Just recently, over two hundred and seventy receipts were printed out for the fete.

At the moment, plenty of other ambitious projects are planned for the future—the handling of bills, the setting of examination papers and the storage of cabinets full of files on a single floppy are just a few of them.

As for us, the students and the incharges, we look forward to the future of this enterprising project of which we are the proud pioneers.

This simple but lovely Memorial—a sundial—was erected in memory of those poor people who died when an explosion tore through the Jumbo jet, Emperor Kanishka, on June 3rd, 1983.

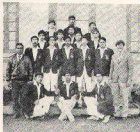

The Emperor Kanishka

On that Sunday morning, June 23rd 1985, it was a little past 8 o'clock. To the south west of Ireland's south coast; a breeze from the Atlantic swept cobwebs of grey cloud inland. At widely spaced intervals among the cobwebby patches there shone out postcard-sized areas of blue. On the green earth underneath the cloud canopy, Church bells summoned the Catholic Irish to Sunday Mass. People glanced upwards towards the grey overcast. They were wondering what the new day would bring—likely more rain.

At Shannon Airport, on Ireland's western sea board, Air Traffic Control Executive, John Hunt studied the clip on the nearby radar screen. It indicated an aircraft flying in an easterly direction at 32,000 feet and just a degree or so south of him. He knew its identity—Air India's Jumbo on course for Heathrow, London—routine procedure. Just then his relief came on duty. John left the Control Room but outside he paused a while—why he cannot explain. A minute or two ticked by and then there was a relief beside him with the words: "That aircraft is off the radar screen". Airport officials initiated the procedure for a possible air disaster.

At more than 30,000 feet, the Emperor Kanishka had been cruising easily. London was less than an hour's flying time away. On board 329 people were involved in the normal morning routine of a giant liner. Stewardesses, busily efficient, pushed trolleys and handled breakfast trays. For the passengers, London was just over the horizon. There would be purchases at "Hills Tops". There would be relatives to be met. If nothing else people would be given the opportunity to stand on English soil and stretch their legs. There was an overall atmosphere of anticipation.

Forward on the Emperor Kanishka's flight deck, the crew went through the routine preparatory to starting the slow descent that would bring the giant Jumbo to earth at Heathrow. From far below and faint through the partings in the clouds came intermittent glimpses of the Irish coast. They were on time. Jumbo was on course—there was nothing to indicate that anything was amiss. Then in one shattering explosion, the Emperor Kanishka blew apart and plunged downward to where the sea was waiting to engulf plane and passengers ... it was 8.05 a.m.

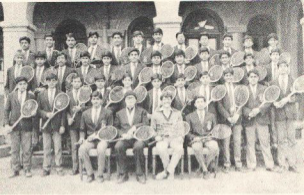

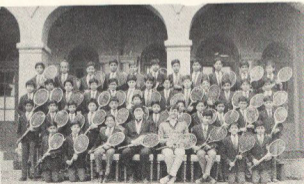
