
A SHORT BIOGRAPHY OF EDMUND RICE FOUNDER OF THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS



Edmund Rice was born in Callan, Ireland, on June 1, 1762. He grew up in a relatively well-off Catholic family where he received a limited education before joining his uncle's business in Waterford, providing supplies for ships and for the British Navy and Army.

Edmund was specially respected in society for his honesty in business and he grew very successful. He married and it is understood that his wife was Mary Elliot. She died at about the time their daughter, also Mary, was born in 1789. The infant was raised by Edmund and his step-sister, Joan, who became his housekeeper.

In his grief and the turmoil of these circumstances, he considered entering religious life.

After much discernment he "abandons the ambitions of his class", sells his business and begins instructing boys of the poor living on the streets of Waterford.

In 1802, the project begins in a stable in the town while a new school is built on the edge of the city closer to where many of the poor resided. The free school, known as Mount Sion, opened in 1803. Edmund and his first couple of helpers were soon caring for two to three hundred students, providing food and clothing as well as an education that would help them in the work places of business and commerce and that would build their prayer life and knowledge of the Bible.

Edmund was following the call of the Spirit into a religious life that would impact both Church and society. He and his helpers lived at Mount Sion and this was the beginning of the Christian Brothers. The Congregation spread quickly throughout the world educating thousands of young boys from economically backward families. Edmund died in 1844. Pope John Paul II beatified Edmund Rice at a ceremony in St. Peter's Square, Rome, on 6th October 1996. He became known as Blessed Edmund Ignatius Rice. His official feast day is May 5.

The highlight of the year was our musical, Joseph And the Amazing Multi Colour Dreamcoat. There were seven shows and all were a huge success.



My best wishes and prayers for the College, Teachers and Students, and may the College rise to even greater heights.



Dear students,

It is an honour and privilege for me to write for the annual magazine of our dearest Alma Mater. I firmly believe that what I am today is primarily due to the time I spent in Sem.

I joined Sem in the year 1980 in Class 3 and spent the next 8 years in the haloed halls of Sem to pass out after appearing in ICSE in March 1988. The memories of the school are so vivid and fresh, from the Sports Days to Swimming meets to rowing in the lake! I still remember some of the poems from Panorama like, 'The Highway Man,' and 'Lancelot'. The dialogues from Shakespeare's 'Merchant of Venice' still roll off the tongue with the same fluidity as they did almost 30 years ago. All thanks to the great teachers we had from Late Bro Donahue and Bro. Comber (the man who taught us to write English properly in class 7). Bro Walsh's classes in Geography were a delight; I still take pride in the fact that we were perhaps the only teens who could actually create a 3D image of a place in our minds seeing a survey map. Harela is a festival celebrated in the Kumaon Region of Uttarakhand. Harela symbolizes the onset of the monsoon season. Basically, Harela is an agricultural festival and the name means a day of 'Greenery'

Harela is celebrated on the first day of Shravan (a month as per the Hindu calendar). Ten days before Harela, the seeds of five or seven types of grains are mixed together and sown in small pots or baskets filled with soil and kept in the house.

The sowing is done by the head of the family. Water is sprinkled on it after prayers. Harela symbolizes the future harvest. yellow leaves that come up in the pots or baskets during germination are called Harela. Harela is cut on the 10th day and people place the leaves or grass on their head.

Harela provides an opportunity to the farmers to test the quality of their seeds.

NUCLEAR PEACE -A MYTH?

Since the antiquity of warfare, humans around the world have attempted to invent a more lethal weapon than the one being utilized. The superiority of finer weapons has been proved time and again, whether we take up the case of the Spanish colonization of the Americas with steel and armour, or, closer to home, the First Battle of Panipat where the gunpowder-fuelled Mughal armies put the valiant Rajputs to rout.

But if the evolution of chipped stone knives into spears or that of crude muskets into assault rifles was not enough, we somehow managed to manufacture ballistic missiles, submarines, laser guided projectiles, IEDs, the list goes on.

Furthermore, we outdid our own destructive capabilities when the first nuclear weapon was discovered, a weapon dangerous enough to make the Earth no better than Mars or Venus if its entire stockpiles in the modern world were put to use. So great was the impact of this weapon, that it was used to bring an end to the greatest war ever fought, the Second World War, and nations have been trying to get their hands on it ever since.

A weapon designed to lay cities flat and bring civilizations to an end, would, no doubt, be destructive, but can it contradictorily be a peacemaker rather than a peace-breaker?

This is a rather paradoxical statement in itself but not without substance.

Branded as nuclear peace, it is a broadly studied topic with varied perspectives, but what actually commands this contradiction? Or, on a more radical note, is it even real in the first place?

Although there are numerous arguments on both sides of the table, I choose to be a loyalist to this contradiction.

Two nations, on the brink of war, with a lot to gain and hypothetically only the dismissive 'collateral damage' to lose will no doubt, engage in a war. But, in a turn of events, both also possess nukes pointed at each other, equipped and capable of being launched

in an instant. As a rule of thumb, both weigh the risks and benefits, and the 'collateral damage' changes into 'non-existence'. The unacceptable high costs of war due to the mutual second strike capability commands an active and precarious peace, thereby creating the phenomenon of nuclear peace.

This phenomenon is unprecedented.

India and Pakistan engaged in four full blown military conflicts over a span of 50 years, up to as recently as 1999. But over the next two decades, none of the belligerents let skirmishes evolve into total war.

The reason? Nuclear weapons.

So mighty was this state of nuclear ownership that not even rock-bottom diplomatic relations were enough to trigger a conflict.

Another discernible precedent of nuclear peace was put forward by the US-North Korean relations.

Probably serving as a déjà vu moment for the USA, 80 years after forcing Imperial Japan to come to negotiations through nuclear threats, America was engaged in healthy diplomacy with North Korea.

Ever since the Korean War (1950-1953), the USA and North Korea were inches from an all out war, threatening each other with disastrous consequences if any should violate the status quo. But as soon as North Korea acquired a nuclear arsenal, America was at the negotiation table with considerable North Korean leverage aiming to achieve the uneasy nuclear peace.

Coming to the end of this dissertation, we can easily deduce that nuclear peace is not a myth but rather a reality that exists on every continent.




'ग्लोबल वार्मिंग' आज विश्व की सबसे बड़ी समस्या के रूप में विराजमान है। ग्लोबल वार्मिंग धरती के वातावरण के तापमान में लगातार हो रही बढ़ोतरी है। इस समस्या से न केवल मनुष्य, बल्कि धरती पर रहने वाले प्रत्येक प्राणी प्रभावित हैं। इस समस्या से निपटने के लिये दुनियाभर में अनेक प्रयास किये जा रहे हैं, किन्तु समस्या कम होने के बजाय दिन—प्रतिदिन बढ़ती ही जा रही है।

ग्लोबल वार्मिंग की समस्या के लिये सबसे ज्यादा जिम्मेदार मनुष्य की गतिविधियाँ हैं। मनुष्य की गतिविधियाँ से कार्बन डाई ऑक्साइड, मिथेन, नाइट्रोजन ऑक्साइड इत्यादि ग्रीनहाउस गैसों की मात्रा वातावरण में लगातार बढ़ रही है, जिससे वातावरण में गैसों का संतुलन बिगड़ता जा रहा है। यही आवरण सूर्य की परावर्तित किरणों को रोक रहा है जिससे धरती के तापमान में वृद्धि हो रही है। वाहनों एवं उद्योगों से अंधाधुंध होने वाले गैसीय उत्सर्जन और प्रदूषण की वजह से वातावरण में कार्बन डाई ऑक्साइड में बढ़ोतरी हो रही है। बड़ी संख्या में हो रहा जंगलों का विनाश भी ग्लोबल वार्मिंग का प्रमुख कारण है।

आज दुनिया के सभी विकसित और विकासशील देश ग्लोबल वार्मिंग की समस्या के प्रति चिन्तित हैं। अब समय आ गया है कि इस समस्या से निपटने के लिये सार्थक प्रयास किया जाय।

समय का सदुपयोग

समय के सदुपयोग का अर्थ है — समय का सही उपयोग। दूसरे शब्दों में हम यह भी कह सकते हैं कि सही समय पर सही कार्य करना ही 'समय का सदुपयोग' कहलाता है। किसी भी प्रकार की सफलता का रहस्य समय का सदुपयोग है। समय वह धन है, जिसका दुरूपयोग करने से पछताने के सिवाय और कुछ नहीं मिलता। जिस प्रकार धन का उपयोग हमें सफल बनाता है, उसी प्रकार समय का नियोजन भी हमें सफलता प्रदान करता है। इसके लिये चिन्तन और सावधानी आवश्यक है।

अर्थात समय पर यदि चूक गये तो जीवन भर पछताना पड़ेगा ठीक उसी प्रकार जैसे खेती सूख जाये फिर वर्षा हुई तो उस वर्शा का कोई महत्व नहीं है। मनुष्य का जीवन अमूल्य है। उसके जीवन का एक—एक पल बहुत महत्वपूर्ण है। मानव जीवन में बाल्यावस्था, किशोरावस्था, प्रौढ़ावस्था और अन्त में वृद्धावस्था एक ही बार आती है। हर अवस्था का अपना अलग—अलग महत्व होता है। एक बार बीत जाने पर पुनः उसे नहीं प्राप्त किया जा सकता है। अतः आवश्यकता इस बात की है कि हम समय का सदुपयोग करें। समय किसी की राह नहीं देखता।

समय सभी के लिये समान रहता है — चाहे वह निर्धन हो या धनवान, राजा हो या रंक, मूर्ख हो या विद्वान। इसलिये सभी को अपना जीवन सफल और सार्थक बनाने हेतु, समय का सदुपयोग करना ही पड़ता है। आज तक जितने भी महान व्यक्ति हैं, सभी ने समय के महत्व को एक मत में स्वीकार किया है। समय के सही सदुपयोग से सामान्य व्यक्ति भी महान बन सकता है और समय का दुरूपयोग महान व्यक्ति को भी अत्यन्त सामान्य। समय की उपेक्षा करने वाले को समय का रथ बुरी तरह रौंद डालता है। शेक्सपीयर का कथन है — "मैंने समय को नष्ट किया और अब समय मुझे नष्ट कर रहा है।"

समय के सदुपयोग करने से जीवन में सरलता आती है। प्रत्येक कार्य के लिये समय मिल जाता है। धरती, सूर्य, चाँद—तारे, यहाँ तक कि सम्पूर्ण प्रकृति समय का पालन करती है तो मनुष्य को भी उसका अनुसरण करना चाहिये। यह कहावत बिल्कुल सत्य है कि "समय तथा समुद्र की लहरें किसी की प्रतिक्षा नहीं करती।" अतः इसके साथ कदम मिलाते चलते रहना चाहिये। अन्यथा हमें समय की उपेक्षा का दंड झेलना ही पडता है।

व्यक्ति को सफलता प्राप्त करने के लिये अपना निश्चित कार्यक्रम बनाकर एवं एकाग्रचित्त होकर कार्य करना चाहिये, तब ही सफलता उसका वरण करेगी। प्रत्येक क्षण का सदुपयोग करना ही बुद्धिमानी है। अतः समय की महत्ता को समझना व पहचानना चाहिये। महादेवी वर्मा ने भी लिखा है —

"तू मोती के द्वीप स्वप्न में राह खोजता तब तो बहता समय शिला–सा जम जायेगा।"

यदि हृदय में कोई कार्य करने की इच्छा उत्पन्न होती है तो उसके लिये प्रतिक्षा नहीं करनी चाहिये। उसे तुरन्त कर देना चाहिये।

समय का मूल्य समय के बीत जाने पर ही ज्ञात होता है। समय के दुरूपयोग से दुख ही हाथ लगता है। समय का भयंकर शत्रु आलस्य है। आलस्य जीवन का कीड़ा है। यदि वह लग जाय तो जीवन को नष्ट कर देता है। समय का दुरूपयोग एक पाप है जो इस पाप के कीचड़ में गिर जाता है, उसका कभी उद्धार नहीं हो सकता है। हमें समय के महत्व का ज्ञान तब होता है जब स्टेशन पर दो मिनट की देरी के कारण हमारी गाड़ी छूट जाती है।

लखपति व्यापारी समय के चूक जाने से भिखारी बन सकता है। पाँच मिनट परीक्षा में देरी से पहुँचने पर छात्र परीक्षा से हाथ धो बैठता है। अतः समय के दुरूपयोग से हमें सदैव बचना चाहिये। महान संत कबीरदास कहते हैं –

''काल्ह करे सो आज कर आज करे सो अब। पल में परलै होइगी, बहुरी करैगो कब।''

आज तक संसार में जितने भी महापुरूष हुये हैं सबने समय के महत्व को समझा और उन्होंने समय के एक—एक क्षण का सदुपयोग किया। विद्यार्थियों के लिये समय अमूल्य निधि है। उनका प्रत्येक कार्य निश्चित समय पर होना चाहिये। बुद्धिमान विद्यार्थी कभी भी अपने समय को व्यर्थ नहीं गंवाते इसलिये उन्हें कभी पछताना नहीं पड़ता।

जीवन में सफलता पाने के लिये समय की अनुकूलता का होना आवश्यक है। यदि समय अनुकूल न हो तो मनुश्य के सारे प्रयत्न निष्फल हो जाते हैं। तुलसीदास जी ने कहा है, ''समय जात नहीं लागिह बारा'' इसलिये समय का उचित मूल्यांकन करते हुये उसका उपयोग करना चाहिये। समय की गित रोकी नहीं जा सकती। अतः यदि हम अपनी शारीरिक, मानसिक और आध्यात्मिक उन्नित चाहते हैं यदि अपने देश और अपनी जाित का उत्थान चाहते हैं तो हमें अपने समय का सद्पयोग करना सीखना चाहिये तभी हमारी उन्नित सम्भव है।

भारतीय संस्कृति

भारतीय संस्कृति विश्व की सबसे प्राचीन एवं समृद्ध संस्कृति है। इसे विश्व की सभी संस्कृतियों की जननी भी माना जाता है। जीने की कला हो या विज्ञान और राजनीति का क्षेत्र, भारतीय संस्कृति का सदैव विशेष स्थान रहा है। अन्य देशों की संस्कृतियाँ तो समय के साथ-साथ नष्ट होती हैं, किन्तु भारत की संस्कृति आदि काल से ही अपने परम्परागत अस्तित्व के साथ आज भी अजर–अमर बनी हुई हैं।

आज के समय में सभ्यता और संस्कृति को एक दूसरे का पर्याय समझा जाने लगा है जिसके फलस्वरूप संस्कृति के सन्दर्भ में अनेक भ्रांतियाँ पैदा हो गयी हैं। लेकिन वास्तव में संस्कृति सभ्यता अलग–अलग होती हैं। सभ्यता का संबंध हमारे बाहरी जीवन के ढंग से होता है यथा खान-पान, रहन-सहन, बोलचाल जबिक संस्कृति का संबंध हमारी सोच, चिंतन और विचारधारा से होता है।

संस्कृति का क्षेत्र सभ्यता से कहीं अधिक व्यापक और गहन होता है। सभ्यता का अनुकरण तो किया जा सकता है, लेकिन संस्कृति का अनुकरण नहीं किया जा सकता है। हम पैंट-कोट पहनकर और अंग्रेजी बोलकर पाश्चात्य सभ्यता का अनुकरण करते हैं, न कि पाश्चात्य संस्कृति का।

संस्कृति किसी भी देश, जाति और समुदाय की आत्मा होती है। संस्कृति से ही देश, जाति या समुदाय के उन समस्त संस्कारों का बोध होता है जिनके सहारे वह अपने आदर्शों, जीवन मूल्यों आदि का निर्धारण करता है। संस्कृति का साधारण अर्थ होता है - संस्कार, सुधार, परिष्कार, शुद्धि, सजावट आदि। भारतीय प्राचीन ग्रन्थों में संस्कृति का अर्थ संस्कार से ही माना गया है।

कौटिल्य जी ने विनय के अर्थ में संस्कृति शब्द का प्रयोग किया है। भारतीय प्राचीन ग्रन्थों में भी अंग्रेजी शब्द कल्चर के समान संस्कृति शब्द का प्रयोग होने लगा है। संस्कृति का अर्थ हम भले ही कुछ निकाल लें, किन्तु संस्कृति का संबंध मानव जीवन के मूल्यों से होता है।

भारतीय संस्कृति विश्व की प्राचीनतम संस्कृतियों में से

एक है। विश्व की विभिन्न संस्कृतियाँ भारतीय संस्कृति के समक्ष पैदा हुई और मिट गयी। भारतीय संस्कृति में महान समायोजन की क्षमता होती है। यहाँ पर विभिन्न संस्कृतियों के लोग आये और यहीं पर बस गये। उनकी संस्कृतियाँ भारतीय संस्कृति का अंग बन गयी। इसी वजह से भारतीय संस्कृति लगातार आगे बढती जा रही है।

भारतीय संस्कृति की पृष्ठभूमि में मानव कल्याण की भावना निहित है। यहाँ पर जो भी काम होते हैं वो बहुजन हिताय और बहुजन सुखाय की दृष्टि से ही होते हैं। यही संस्कृति भारतवर्ष की आर्दश संस्कृति होती है। भारत की संस्कृति की मूल भावना ''वसुधैव कुटुम्बकम'' के पवित्र उद्देश्य पर आधारित है अर्थात सभी सुखी हों, सब निरोग हों, सबका कल्याण हो, किसी को भी दुःख प्राप्त न हो ऐसी पवित्र भावनायें भारत वर्ष में सदैव प्राप्त होती रहें।

advising them to be role models for all the students. The investiture ceremony concluded with the singing of the College and the National Anthems.
















JUNIOR-SCHOOL INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION

INAUGURATION OF THE NEW COMPUTER LAB





Team Aryabhata was the runner up.
























LLA MARTINIERE, LUCKNOW

JUNIOR SCHOOL SPELLING COMPETITION







TELESCOPE WORKSHOP

Sem had the pleasure of hosting two great Belgian Astronomers on 23rd March 2019. It was organised by Dr. S.B. Pandey scientist of ARIES. Br. Hector welcomed the Astronomers Dr. Jean Surdej, Dr. Anna Surdej and Dr. S.B. Pandey.

Dr. Jean Surdej is (PI) Principal Investigator for the International Liquid Mirror Telescope. His wife Dr. Anna Surdej is also an Astronomer working for the Liquid Mirror Telescope in DEVSTHAL. Dr. S.B. Pandey, Astronomer, has been Instrumental in Installing Asia's largest Telescope and other telescopes in DEVSTHAL. Dr. Jean Surdej gave a talk about celestial bodies - stars, planets, asteroids and different galaxies. He mentioned that every star has planets rotating and revolving like in our solar system. In the interactive session he explained about bending of light, black holes, dark matter, liquid lens telescope, features of the moons back surface and so on. The audience listened to his talk with utmost interest. Fascinating questions were asked and were answered. We are sure that he has ignited many minds and hope some end up as great astronomers.








SABRANG

FILM MAKING ADVENTURE





Beginning with this year, St. Joseph's added a filmmaking course that was made available to its students. 24 students from class 6 to 9 joined the film making workshop. The course started with a demo class for all students from class 6 to 9 after which students who were interested in the class gave their names and the workshop began. The workshop took place intermittently over the course of the year and took 15 days to complete.



The first few sessions of the workshop were all about getting the students acquainted with the craft of filmmaking. In this pursuit the students were shown films by renowned filmmakers such as Abaas Kirostami and

Satyajit Ray as well as other student films made by students of other Nainital schools. Long, intense discussions about the craft of filmmaking, such as a session on the basics of storytelling and a session on camera and sound basics were also taken up to get the students ready for making their films.

Each group had to come up with a story and then write a screenplay for the said story. This long and intense process led to the creation of 3 different scripts from students about life in a boarding school.




SANSKRITI

Gaurav Dhondiyal from class 11 was awarded the Best Player of the tournament.






















The hymn, "How Great Thou Art" was presented by the College Choir thanking God for the gift of such wonderful teachers.


Ms. S. Pandey and Mr. Dogra thanked the management and the colleagues for providing opportunities to make a difference in the lives of so many of the children.

INSPECTOR'S REPORT-1917

J. Murray, Esq., M.A., Inspector of European School, United Provinces, paid his annual official visit on the 23rd of August and reported as follows:-

The enrolment was greater by 24 than at the last inspection on the 9th of September, 1916. It had been found necessary to refuse admission to some fifty or more of this year's applicants.

The arrangements for the work were practically identical with those found last year and were excellent. With the exception of perhaps one teacher (who was taking the work of Standard I and the Infants) it would probably be impossible to improve on the existing staff; and as for the quality of the work done it was sufficiently attested by the results of public examinations which, as indicated below, were very good. Examination results doubtless are not everything, but they are on a whole as satisfactory a test of the quality of the class work as it is possible to find under existing conditions, and in general where the class work is first class, the examination results will also be The institution aims at giving a thorough training on the broadest possible lines and such a training will prove its value not only in the examination hall, but if I mistake not in after life as well. I may note that I did not find effort concentrated on the examination standards. So far as I could judge, the work seemed just as good in all the other standards. Spurts for special purposes have little educational value and are not regarded with favour by the authorities of the institution. They believe only in sound and thorough training throughout all standards and it is certain that thus only can be education of the best class be assured. They are certainly fortunate in their staff which, as indicated above, has probably no weak spot. member is probably capable of taking the work of any standard and it is the general practice to give the same teacher the same boys throughout the school who

takes them from, say, Standard IV right up to the Senior Examination. The uniformly excellent results from year to year shew how well the system works. Such a system might not work equally well in every school and doubtless some risks attach, but here the risks seem to be successfully avoided, which again is a testimony to the quality of the staff. Further, if there are risks there are also advantages in such a system. The teacher gets to know each and every one of his boys completely, his weaknesses and his strong points and can help him in the most effective way to get over the one and to develop the other.

It is probable that if the risks can, as here, be avoided the system is the best possible for training pupils and for enabling them to make the very most of their time at School. The system could of course be prejudiced, and in the worst case reduced to ineffectiveness, by migration of boys from school to school, but I was glad to see that comparatively few of the pupils in the various higher standards here were newcomers and that by far the greater number stayed on right through their school career. A migrating school population used to be rather a prominent feature a number of years ago in practically every school in these Provinces. Ithink it is now far less generally prominent than it used to be, which may be an indication on the one hand of greater intelligence on the parts of parents and better understanding of school conditions, and on the other hand of increasing excellence in the schools and of increasing satisfaction among parents as to the work of the schools.

For the preliminary of last year (December 1916) 27 candidates entered and 26 passed, two with 1st Class Honours, two with 2st Class Honours and five with 3st class Honours. Six qualified in each of the eight subjects offered, six qualified in seven subjects out of

eight permissible, and nine in six subjects. Only two qualified in the minimum number of subjects (four) required for a certificate. Eleven qualified out of sixteen who offered Urdu and nineteen out of twenty-four that offered Ten qualified in two Latin. languages, nine in Latin and Urdu and one in Latin and French. Two offered three languages, Latin, French and Urdu, but both failed in French and one failed also in Urdu. Both would probably have done batter to replace one of the three languages by History, which neither of them offered. Only two failed in Geography out of 27. The results in the Preliminary were therefore extremely good and shewed what could be done by candidates who had gone right through the complete course of preparation under the conditions obtaining in this school.

In the Junior, 21 qualified for the certificate out of 31 who sat. One gained third Class Honours. Two qualified in six sections out of 7½ permissible, three in five and five in four. Fourteen qualified in three sections, the minimum, and of these three failed to secure a certificate for one reason or another. The results were good, but not quite so good as those of the Preliminary. This is not surprising, seeing that most of the Junior candidates had not gone right through the complete course of preparation from the lower standards, but had come into the work at a somewhat later stage. Scripture, English, History, Geometry. Algebra and Freehand and Geometrical Drawing were the best subjects, and in most of these nearly all the candidates qualified.

In the Senior of December last five qualified out of seven candidates, three of the five gaining Honours, one in each of the three classes. The results were good, but the results of this and future years may be expected to be much better as candidates come on who have been preparing for a longer time along the lines of the locals."
