Crestfallen

An adjective, crestfallen means disappointed and dispirited because of an unexpected failure. Origin of the word: The term crestfallen was

coined in the late 16th century in relation to fallen or defeated animals. A crest is a tuft of feathers or comb on the crown of some birds and mammals. Experts are divided over which animal gave us the word. Some believe that roosters with their crested heads are responsible for the word's origins. Others say that horses bowing their heads afer losing a battle inspired the term. Today, crestfallen refers to humans when they are in low spirits, typically with their head hanging down.




